Cytisus 'Burkwoodii' Common name: Burkwoodii Family name: Fabaceae

Facts: Cytisus derives from Greek kytisos, a name applied by Ancient Greeks to woody leguminosae.

Burkwoodii named after brothers Arthur and Albert Burkwood, 19th century hybridisers of plants.

Both Arthur (1888-1951) and Albert (1890-?) were trained nurserymen who went on to establish their own business in Kingston Upon Thames, Surrey, England.

Position: Full sun.

Hardiness: Frost hardy up to -15°C.

➤ Flowering: Early summer flowering clusters of reddish pea-like flowers, often highly fragrant.

Propagation: Propagate by hardwood cuttings in late autumn (cold-frame).

Pruning: Little or no pruning is necessary (dead, diseased or damaged).

➤ **Pest and diseases:** Generally, pest and disease free but maybe affected by honey fungus 'Armillaria mellea'.

Note: Plants resent transplanting.
